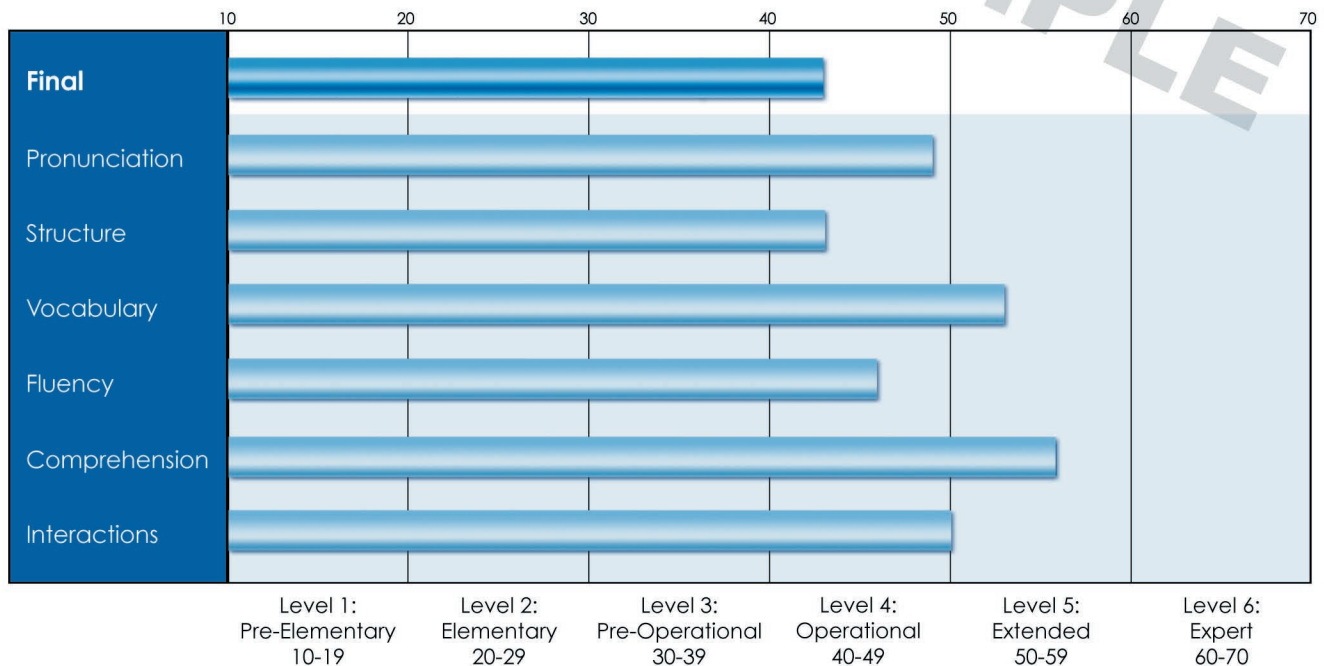

Understanding the Final Score

The Versant Aviation English Test measures the candidate's spoken English skills both in the ICAO phraseologies domain and in the common English domain. The test complies with ICAO document 9835-AN/453 – *Manual on the Implementation of the ICAO Language Proficiency Requirements*.

ICAO stipulates that the overall rating is determined by the lowest level achieved on a sub-skill of the test. In other words, to achieve an overall score of Level 4 – Operational, the candidate must demonstrate proficiency at Level 4 in all sub-skills.

Explanation of Sub-skill Scores

Pronunciation Level 4: Operational	48	Pronunciation, stress, rhythm, and intonation are influenced by the first language or regional variation but only sometimes interfere with ease of understanding.
Structure Level 4: Operational	42	Basic grammatical structures and sentence patterns are used creatively and are usually well controlled. Errors may occur, particularly in unusual or unexpected circumstances, but rarely interfere with meaning.
Vocabulary Level 5: Extended	52	Vocabulary range and accuracy are sufficient to communicate effectively on common, concrete, and work-related topics. Paraphrases consistently and successfully. Vocabulary is sometimes idiomatic.
Fluency Level 4: Operational	45	Produces stretches of language at an appropriate tempo. There may be occasional loss of fluency on transition from rehearsed or formulaic speech to spontaneous interaction, but this does not prevent effective communication. Can make limited use of discourse markers or connectors. Fillers are not distracting.
Comprehension Level 5: Extended	55	Comprehension is accurate on common, concrete, and work-related topics and mostly accurate when the speaker is confronted with a linguistic or situational complication or an unexpected turn of events. Is able to comprehend a range of speech varieties (dialect and/or accent) or registers.
Interactions Level 5: Extended	50	Responses are immediate, appropriate, and informative. Manages the speaker/listener relationship effectively.

Explanation of ICAO Levels

Note the following from the *Manual on the Implementation of the ICAO Language Proficiency Requirements*, document 9835-AN/453:

"The Operational Level (Level 4) is the minimum required proficiency level for radiotelephony communication. Levels 1 through 3 describe Pre-elementary, Elementary, and Pre-operational levels of language proficiency, respectively, all of which describe a level of proficiency below the ICAO language proficiency requirement. Levels 5 and 6 describe Extended and Expert levels, at levels of proficiency more advanced than the minimum required Standard. As a whole, the scale will serve as benchmarks for training and testing, and in assisting candidates to attain the ICAO Operational Level (Level 4)."
